The traditional signing of the UK flag and posing for photos was followed by a cocktail organised by Alexandra Denizet on the lycée terrace.



MEET STEPHEN PERA

NEW TEACHER IN COLLEGE & LYCEE

Hi and hello! I sincerely hope you (parent, student, other teacher), are enjoying your week or weekend. I tell my students that there is usually no need to invoke the awareness of the reader, to extend a literary hand for shaking directly from the text, but here is one of those rare cases where such feels necessary. This space here—the one you're skimming over now or reading intently— is intimate; it's about me. As a result, it should feel as though you were here, actually meeting me. It should feel welcoming, safe, and jovial.

Before jumping into the verbose, I should be concise with the essential answers to the essential questions that most of my students have already asked me: I am 30 years old, I am American, I was born in Philadelphia, I got my degree in Education at Temple University in Philadelphia, I'm a passionate writer and an avid reader, I'm married, I live to teach, I don't have children and I currently live in Paris.

Before moving to Paris, purely for the cheese and baguettes and for no other discernible reason, I was living and working elsewhere, eastward in Mongolia. I spent 4 memorable years within the land of the blue sky. "Life there, what was it like?" is a question you might be conjuring up about now.

It's a complicated answer. There's the obvious: -40 C winters, meat of surprising variety in every dish, countryside kindness, endless open steppe, cultural celebrations, archery, herding, a bewildering language and wrestling. But even as exotic as I may have wanted it to be, as the country may seem, there exist familiar structures. Mongolia is more like home, like my native USA, or even France than I imagined. It's similar to looking at a painting otherwise familiar, with the expected shapes and figures, but the hues are different. It's subtle. The blues are red and the yellows, more green, but still, you recognize the picture. That's how Mongolia was for me: a familiar scene painted with a new variety of colors I didn't think possible. Strange, beautiful, certainly different. During the first two years of my time in Mongolia, I was a Peace Corps Volunteer. After finishing my education degree in Philadelphia, I decided I wanted to see more and do some good along the way. During my time, I taught English as well as worked on community-wide projects. Following my two years of service in the capital of Ulaanbaatar and the western city of Gobi Altai, I made the decision to remain and teach at an international school back in the capital. The moment that led me to France was simple: I fell in love with and later married someone French.

Together we moved, this past June, to Paris. I spent the summer fumbling about the French language, eating entirely too much of everything, and finding an exciting opportunity to teach your children at the Section Internationale.

Now it's end of October and, despite the exhaustion of 6 AM alarms and lonely morning metro rides, I feel wholeheartedly satisfied. Each school day is a multifaceted challenge of balancing content with behavior with attention with empathy. I work to help each of your children succeed, to help them find a sense of ownership and pride in their learning, to carve out an identity or narrative they feel is inherently their own. I am passionate about what I do. I am good at what I do.

Knowing who I am, and hopefully learning about who each of you are is important. I am a proponent of social learning, of Lev Vygotsky's idea of creating a "learning community." I believe we need each other in order to become the best people we can be. So please, never hesitate to talk with me, whenever the need or interest arises. I'll leave the rest of this "about me" with a piece of something I write and rewrite yearly: my philosophy of education. I look forward to working with each of you during the school year.


"I believe that a teacher is not only a guide, purposed to meet the educational, developmental and social needs of students, but an objective presence who can and will momentarily withhold their own ideological presumptions and convictions in order to listen and potentially see a challenge, issue or idea through the eyes of a student. Progressive in principle, such a teacher crafts a curriculum, distinctive of the individual student's needs, interests and choice. steeped in investigative experience and educational opportunity, foundational for "learning how to learn" within an exponentially transformative world. Education within the classroom is a collaborative practice between teachers, students and the community, which creates a diversified set of academic opportunity that collectively accommodates the social, cultural, and developmental identities of each student."

- You can already start by creating an account (if you do not already have one) and uploading existing documents, such as the school reports for CM1. Remember to press **SAVE** to avoid losing everything.
- Please keep an eye on your child's exercise books and homework as you will need to submit a handwritten sample, marked by Mrs Ruth Hasid. You may submit as many pieces of work as you wish, as long as they are compiled in one PDF document of under 10 MB. Creative writing, book reports etc are all good examples whereas grammar exercises and spelling tests are not...Please remember that the admissions team and college teachers do not know your child and will initially use this work to assess his/her level so make sure you pick out the best examples of their work.
- You should inform Mrs Ruth Hasid as soon as possible that you
 wish to apply for our college programme as she needs to submit
 an English Teacher Recommendation Form to the admissions
 office. These take time and investment and should not be
 requested at the last minute...


